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
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

I would like to encourage everyone to take advantage of the many resources available through our parent organizations WEF and AWWA. These organizations strive for world class service to their members by consolidating relevant information in one location. The chances are you will know someone within the WEF or AWWA communities that has dealt with that same issue you struggle with today.

The AWWA website (www.awwa.org) was updated December 2012 in an effort to make it easier to navigate. There is much more to be found that the latest standards and the status of your membership account. Of particular value is the Resource Communities, under the Resources & Tools tab. The Resource Community is a collaborative area for sharing information, tools and learning opportunities by topic area. Example topics include Emergency Preparedness, Customer Service, Asset Management and Small Systems.

#### ACWWA to form our own WARN

WWA's recent member value survey has given us a lot of information about what member value about AWWA. As I indicated in the last issue, 67% of AWWA members say that AWWA is indispensable to their careers. One of the things that members indicate they value most is the myriad of technical resources such as standards, manuals of practice, videos, guide books, text books, and the list goes on and on.

As I am writing this I am in the midst of reading a newly released book from AWWA that is fascinating reading. Chlorine Revolution, by Michael McGuire was released by AWWA in April. Mike McGuire has had a storied career as a water quality and disinfection expert in the utility, academic and consulting fields. His thoroughly researched book, takes an in depth look at the history of disinfection of water and the profound effect it has had on public health, specifically the prevention of waterborne disease. He specifically answers questions such as how Patterson, New Jersey came to be the site of the first use of chlorine in North America and how the public was convinced to accept the adding of a 'poison' to their drinking water.

I would highly recommend this book for its historical value but more so for the fact that it gives a stark reminder of what we have accomplished as a profession in protecting public health and the importance of the safeguards we may take for granted today.

AWWA had another successful ACE in Denver and now it is time to start looking forward to our own ACWWA

conference in Fredericton, September 29 – October 1. Scott Grasman and his committee have an excellent event planned. I will be honoured to host AWWA Past President Charlie Anderson. Charlie is from Arlington, Texas and spent most of his career working for the City of Arlington. Charlie passionate about the value AWWA provides for each of us and I look forward to hearing him share his thoughts with us.

In a previous report I mentioned how the water utilities in the New Jersey, New York, and Connecticut areas were able to recover quickly after Hurricane Sandy through the aid of the local WARNs (Water Agency Response Networks). 
If you want more information on WARN, just go to the AWWA website and type WARN into the search box.

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
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#### Striving to give you the best training

#### WEFTEC 2013 wants more of your ingenious fixes

Following last year's success, WEFTEC 2013 is seeking more creative, innovative, and simple solutions to the persistent problems operators face every day. Often the big solutions come from a tweak here or a little fix there.

WEFTEC wants to showcase these imaginative, inventive, and effective ways you have found to overcome those pesky problems. Selected inventors will be invited to give 10-minute presentations in the WEFTEC Innovation Pavilion.

#### 2012 set a high bar

Last year's contest attracted more than two-dozen entries. Six received awards.

**Safety:** A ladder extension pole that quickly attaches to the rungs inside the manhole – This device helps operators be safer and meet safety requirements.

**Process control:** A foot-operated sample collector to pump mixed liquor samples from beneath a foam-covered surface – This pump eliminated heavy lifting and sample contamination from

lifting the sample through the foam.

Maintenance: A PVC pipe cover for a pump's lifting chain – By protecting the chain from being tangled with rags and other debris, the cover enables a chain follower to operate better when the pump needs to be removed.

Work Environment: Color-coded facility buildings – By painting each building a different color, operators beautified their facility as well as added a quick and easy way to help visitors and contractors navigate to the right spot.

Resourcefulness: Using compost heat to thaw sludge lines – Winter temperatures froze the sludge lines into a temporary trailer-mounted dewatering unit, operators packed the frozen lines with finished compost that generated its own heat and kept the lines running free.

Walking the Talk: Installing a stormwater filter – Operators installed a stormwater best management practice to reduce the total suspended solids in the runoff leaving the facility's yard.

#### Now it is your turn

As the examples show, the competition is open to all clever ideas related to treatment processes, collection systems, laboratory practices, administration, human resources, you name it. The solution can be a physical tool or a new approach to an old problem.


The bottom line: Even if you are not sure that your innovation qualifies, submit it.

So, pull together a roughly one-page description of the problem you faced and the fix you found. If your invention or idea can be photographed, snap a picture an include that. Submitters do not have to write a full WEFTEC paper.

Atlantic Canada has always been a leader in water/ wastewater, why not give this a try, great challenge for the Halifax Water wastewater operators.

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#### CWWA shares its views... Water and the New Long-Term Infrastructure Plan

WWA is the National voice for the water industry in Canada representing municipalities across Canada including the private sector partners supporting municipal drinking water and wastewater services.

Municipal water services are profoundly important to Canada's economy, communities and environment, and are in urgent need of strategic investment.

CWWA issued a detailed letter to all members of parliament in advance of the federal budget presentations. The federal budget detailed announcements to the tune of \$70 Billion in infrastructure funding over the next 10 years. The following five (5) key messages were highlighted in the submission:

• CWWA supports the position of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) that any new funding program must be truly long term and predictable.

- The new funding program should be an incentive to move toward sustainability.
- CWWA hopes that the federal government will identify water and wastewater projects as a priority category in any new plan.
- CWWA request that the federal government provide targeted funding to support the massive new costs associated with implementing new federal legislation, particularly the Wastewater Systems Effluent Regulations.
- CWWA suggests the concept that innovative new technologies, service delivery models and financial strategies are a key to facing then challenges of infrastructure renewal.

CWWA issued an immediate preliminary review of the infrastructure funding over the next ten years and suggested the announced amount was less than hoped for, but still welcomed news CWWA will continue to monitor the progress on this most important issue for the water industry.

#### Other CWWA activities and news: **Building Partnerships – A Stronger Voice**

CWWA continues to examine ways to improve and strengthen the national voice of Canada's water sector. Representatives from all Member Associations (ACWWA, RE, OWWA, WEAO, WCW, BCWWA) met to continue discussions on what role CWWA could hold to assist and enable the stronger water voice across the country. More work continues to define the concept and determine how to make the vision a reality. A preliminary Business Plan has been prepared to produce an educational booklet outlining the issues around infrastructure renewal. A final proposal will be brought before the regional partners. CWWA continues to partner with the Canadian Association for Water Quality (CAWQ) and serves as the Canadian National Congress (CNC) and the Governing Member of the International Water Association (IWA) in Canada.

#### **Wastewater Systems** Effluent Regulations (WSER) -**CWWA Discussion Panel**

CWWA recently hosted the successful National Wastewater Management Conference in conjunction with the Canadian Association for Water Quality (CAWQ) during March in Hamilton, Ontario. More than 250 delegates heard presentations over a three day event.

As part of the conference CWWA hosted a panel discussion on the new Wastewater Systems Effluent Regulations, which included a Q&A session with James Arnott from Environment Canada being interviewed by Tony Van Rossum of the city of London. This was followed by panel presentations on the challenges of implementation. The

Much of the discussion during the session focused on the status of negotiations with the provinces. The goal is for the provincial governments to enforce the new regulations through administrative or equivalency agreements with the provinces. The negotiations are slow.

#### NPSH and why it is important to pump operation

n order for water and wastewater pumping applications to operate correctly, it is important that the pump system be examined from a mechanical and hydraulic standpoint. The pump is responsible for applying mechanical energy to the fluid (usually water or sewage for municipal service) to make it overcome the static and dynamic losses in the hydraulic system. Proper pump selection of the pumping system involves paying attention to the differential head across the pump as well as meeting the requirements for Net Positive Suction Head (NPSH).

NPSH is defined as the absolute total dynamic head less the absolute vapor pressure of the pumped liquid at the pump centerline or impeller eye. For purposes of design and operation we need to pay attention to the required and available NPSH as defined below:

 NPSH<sub>R</sub>—The minimum NPSH at which a pump can properly operate for a given discharge

- rate without cavitating. This information is determined by the pump manufacturer and is typically supplied on the characteristic pump performance curve.
- NPSH<sub>A</sub>—The NPSH at which the pump suction in a given system operates at a given discharge rate. This must be calculated and it is not on a pump curve.

When  $NPSH_A < NPSA_R$  the liquid pumped will vaporize forming small bubbles in the suction region of the pump resulting in cavitation. As the fluid in the pump is pressurized these bubbles suddenly collapse and the energy released during this sudden collapse can damage the pump components. Cavitation can impinge on pump components and discharge piping leading to damage such as the pitting or cavitation burn indicated in the attached picture. In the field cavitation is usually observed by any combination of the following:

reduced flow,

- loud noise described as grinding or "gravel" in the pump,
- high vacuum suction pressures, or
- high discharge pressure gauge readings.

The system designer and operators have control over NPSH, and must take into consideration suction pipe length, suction lift, pipe diameter and valve positioning during design and operation. Minimum NPSH 4/ NPSH<sub>p</sub> ratios recommended by the Hydraulic Institute range from 1.1 to 2.5 depending on the pumps specific suction energy (Low to Very High). It is recommended to consult with Hydraulic Institute publications and pump manufacturers to determine the recommended NPSH. for your pumping application. Additional NPSH margins of safety should be considered to cover uncertainties in NPSH<sub>4</sub>. Failure to meet these requirements can result in frequent replacement of pump components and undesirable pump performance.

#### Working hard to deliver online courses

t the time of writing this article the ACWWA 2013 spring education program is well underway and the education committee is working hard to plan our fall program. #### Government Affairs Submitted on behalf of the ACWWA Government Affairs Committee

#### Funding of Municipal Water & Wastewater in Newfoundland and Labrador

ewfoundland and Labrador recently announced changes to the Municipal Operating Grants (MOGs) and capital works program for communities in the province. Budget 2013 included a commitment to maintain MOGs at existing funding levels for communities under 11,000 residents for 2013, and will provide \$22 million to fund MOGs in 2014. In addition, \$25 million has been identified to fund a new capital works program for the seven municipalities in the province with populations greater than 11,000.

Discussions between the Department of Municipal Affairs (DMA) and Municipalities Newfoundland and Labrador (MNL) will begin shortly on a review of the provincial-municipal fiscal framework. Current cost-share ratios for municipal infrastructure investment introduced in 2008 are as follows:

- 90/10 for populations less than 3,000 (258 municipalities, 31 per cent of provincial population);
- 80/20 for populations between 3,000 and 7,000 (16 municipalities, 14 per cent of provincial population);
- 70/30 for populations greater than

7,000 (9 municipalities, 43 per cent of provincial population); and

• Local Service Districts in the province would also qualify for funding supports on approved projects. These uniform ratios are based on population and were meant to provide a streamlined and simplified approach to accessing capital works funding on a go-forward basis. Since the new cost share ratios have been in place, the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador has spent between \$16 and \$78.6 million annually on water and sewer infrastructure.

Strategic Plan are to:

**Number and Value:** Up to Four/\$1,000 (one for each Atlantic Canadian province: NB, NL, NS, and PEI)

- Be registered as a full-time student in a post secondary institution in Atlantic Canada;
- Have successfully completed at least one year of post secondary education;
- Intend to pursue a career related to the water or wastewater industry.

**Fields of Study:** University degree in engineering/ science or college diploma in water/wastewater field.

#### Assessment criteria:

- Academic record after at least one year completion of post secondary education (30%);
- Statement/essay (60%); and
- Work experience and extracurricular activities (10%).
- Preference will be given to a candidate with a demonstrated interest in working in the water or wastewater treatment sectors.

**Application:** The application shall include

- Contact information including name, phone number, mailing and email addresses;
- A 500-word statement or essay of the applicant's interest, knowledge and future goals in the water/ wastewater industry together with applicable work experience or extracurricular activities;
- · A description/list of planned future studies; and
- Supporting documents including i) an official transcript completed to date, and ii) a copy of passport (the page showing your name, nationality and place of birth), citizenship/PR certificate or birth certificate.

The Scholarships Committee accepts only electronic application which should be received via email by October 18, 2013. Scanned copies of the supporting documents are required. The original copy of official transcripts may be directly mailed by the institution.

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#### Moncton recognized for water stewardship

MONCTON (GNB) - The City of Moncton was recognized in April with the Council of the Federation Excellence in Water Stewardship Award for its automated water meter reading project.

This award, which recognizes outstanding achievement, innovative practice and leadership in water stewardship, is being presented as part of Canada Water Week and World Water Day. It is being presented to one organization, partnership, institution or community group in each province and territory.

"In New Brunswick, we understand the fundamental importance of water and recognize our Collective obligation to be responsible water stewards for New Brunswick, for Canada and for the world," said Environment and Local Government Minister Bruce Fitch.

The City of Moncton is the first

municipality in Canada to complete a full installation of the Radio Frequency Fixed Network System, which monitors the water usage and leakage of 20,000 residential and 1,400 commercial, industrial and institutional users. The system has had a significant impact in decreasing the amount of water consumed and lost through leaks and breaks, resulting in lower bills and more water conserved.

This award is part of a larger strategy to improve stewardship of water resources and foster best practices across Canada. New Brunswickers can help by examining their "water footprint" and considering ways that they can reduce their water consumption while conserving and protecting water supplies by:

- washing full loads of laundry each time to save water and electricity;
- using a bucket and sponge instead of a running hose to wash a car;
- buying products that take less

water to produce;




- collecting water in a rain barrel to use for watering flowers and trees;
- using a broom instead of water to clean driveways;
- restoring shoreline vegetation to reduce erosion along lakes and rivers; and
- using eco-friendly detergents, shampoos and soaps.

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

#### E. John Bliss Water Treatment Plant



Named after former Fredericton City Engineer E. John Bliss, P.Eng., the E. J. Bliss Water Treatment Plant commenced operation

and drinking water production in 2009, after a detailed design, construction, and commissioning process overseen by exp Services. The manganese removal plant was constructed to provide treatment for the water supply's newest wellfield development in the Queen Square neighbourhood, and to supplement the supply capacity of the existing W.L. Barrett Water Treatment Plant, itself a Canadian Water Landmark named after another long time City Engineer, William L. Barrett, P.Eng.

A tour of this state-of-the-art facility will provide visitors with information pertaining to groundwater treatment for excess levels of manganese. The plant uses chlorine and lime pre-treatment in advance of pressure filtration vessels to remove the excess manganese and provide distribution system protection for the City's drinking water customers. Participants can also learn about the use of computerized monitoring and controls for all of the wells, booster stations & reservoirs in the water distribution system.

#### Fredericton Area Pollution Control Commission Wastewater Treatment Facility



The Fredericton Area Pollution Control Commission's (FAPCC) Barker Street facility is a secondary wastewater treatment plant

that treats the majority of wastewater for City of Fredericton residents. Originally constructed in 1970, the facility has undergone a series of upgrades in 1976 and 1994. The facility was reaching design biological and hydraulic load maxima and plant performance was beginning to be impacted. Additionally environmental standards were becoming more stringent requiring consideration of further upgrades.

In 2005 a Comprehensive Technical Assistance Program was carried out and between 2005 and 2007 a series of changes were made. A detailed design was completed by CBCL in 2010 and through Build Canada Funding, a two phase project was undertaken. Phase 1A included modifications/ upgrades to the existing secondary clarifier and Phase 1B included construction of a second aerated biological treatment tank. Phase 1B will be completed by the August of 2013.

With the completion of the Phase 1 projects the facility will continue to achieve the new Environment Canada "Wastewater Systems Effluent Regulations (WSER)" established this year. Come visit the facility and learn about how the City of Fredericton and FAPCC partnered to provide much needed upgrades to the plant while continuing to meet required maintenance of this important part of our Utility's functions.
